

WHEREAS, the State has not fulfilled its obligation of funding pursuant to section 6304 of the Education law, and most County sponsors have not increased their contribution to operating costs; and

WHEREAS, this has put the burden of funding our community colleges on the students and families in the form of substantial increases in tuition, as students now pay on average 43.9% of costs across SUNY community college and 40.1% at CUNY community colleges; and

WHEREAS, our students are among the most financially vulnerable; and

WHEREAS, community colleges have responded to budgetary pressures by taking such actions as decreasing full time faculty, curtailing student services, cutting programs, and deferring needed maintenance of physical plants, all of which have direct negative impact on the students of the community colleges as well as the surrounding environs; and

WHEREAS, appropriate funding of community colleges represents an investment in the economic recovery and continued economic health of the state and a commitment to providing affordable and accessible higher education to New York's citizens; and

WHEREAS, the SUNY and CUNY Board of Trustees, the New York Community College Association of Presidents (NYCCAP), and the Faculty Council of Community Colleges have proposed a "Rational Revenue Plan" for the community colleges that would bring the State closer to its statutory funding obligation, be it therefore

RESOLVED, NYSUT strongly urges the Governor and the State Legislature to meet the state law requirement to fund 40% of the costs at all community colleges.

RESOLVED, NYSUT will consider all necessary and available means and options to secure this fair funding.
