Per state law, CUNY and SUNY fouryear campuses must fund the difference between TAP awards (\$5,000) and the full tuition rates of \$6,730 (CUNY) and \$6,870 (SUNY) out of their own operating revenue. The cost for 2018-19 is

New York has invested heavily in making college affordable to students. The Tuition Assistance Program spends \$900 million a year to support more than 300,000 students. However, SUNY and CUNY must fund, or "eat", the difference as the "gap" between TAP awards and actual tuition costs grows with every annual tuition increase. It is unfair that campuses must cover it with their own operating revenue. The TAP GAP has cost public colleges \$700 million since 2012.
