#### OPENING CHAPTER MEETING, 1-3 PM, TUESDAY, SEPT. 8<sup>th</sup>.

Both the PSC and the New York State United Teachers (NYSUT), our 600,000 member state affiliate, have been in the forefront of the defense of public education in our state and city. The PSC begins a new semester with an intensified membership mobilization for a new contract. We'll have reports from the front lines at our inaugural meeting of the semester.



**Barbara Bowen** will open the program with her annual "State of the Union" report.

**Paul Pecorale,** Vice President of our state affiliate will give a "State of NYSUT" report. VP Pecorale will not only review NYSUT's higher education and retiree initiatives, but its important work defending K-12 public education in New York State.

We meet at 61 Broadway,  $16^{th}$  floor, in PSC Union Hall, 1 - 3 PM. Light refreshments will be served.

The chapter's Executive Committee meets at 10:30 AM in the PSC's Justice Room, 15<sup>th</sup> floor. Executive Committee meetings are open to all members.

Note that this meeting is on a Tuesday. All other chapter meetings are the first Monday of the month. Our two luncheons, in January and June, are the second Monday of the month.

**THE RETIREES CHAPTER DOES THE TOUR DE BRONX. SUNDAY, OCTOBER 25.** The Retirees Chapter will ride in the 20<sup>th</sup> annual Tour de Bronx, a twenty-five mile ride through the borough's 61 neighborhoods. This is New York State's largest free bicycling event, beginning at the Grand Concourse and 161<sup>st</sup> Street (in the shadow of Yankee Stadium) and ending with a festival at the NY Botanical Garden.

This is a family friendly event for every age and skill level accompanied by marshals and NYPD escorts. And it's a wonderful opportunity for PSC retirees to bike and bond.

#### HAPPY BIRTHDAY MEDICARE AND MEDICAID AT 50

#### On Wednesday, July 30th,

hundreds of events across the United States celebrated the 50th birthday of Medicare and Medicaid. In New York, a diverse crowd cutting across generations, communities, labor organizations, race and gender, packed the PSC Union Hall to salute the historic legislation passed in July 1965 as the Title XVIII (Medicare) and Title XIX (Medicaid) Amendments to the original 1935 Social Security Act.

Speaker after speaker not only talked about the urgency of defending these programs, but expanding them until all Americans are guaranteed affordable, public healthcare. Medicare and Medicaid already cover 125 million Americans and a recent poll found that an extraordinary rate of satisfaction, 95%, among Medicare users.

The day was full of personal stories, starting with Sharon Persinger, PSC Treasurer, who welcomed guests to our Union Hall and told how Medicare provided a lifeline in the 1960s to her ailing grandfather, a West Virginia coalminer. Others followed with moving testimonials about how Medicare and Medicaid, from asthma to heart attacks to mental health issues, delivered lifesaving care to family members.

Letitia James, the New York City Public Advocate, reminded the audience that the Title XVIII and XIX legislation played a pivotal role in desegregating hospitals, particularly in the South.

A special panel, including our own John Hyland, Co-Chair of the PSC's Safety Net Working Group, led a discussion on organizing to protect, improve and expand Medicare and Medicaid.

To conclude, everybody in the hall sang a rousing chorus of happy birthday and dined on birthday cake.

#### **REDISCOVERING RETIREMENT:**

Our own stories about transition

This is a continuing series. The following piece is by Gerhard Joseph, retired, Lehman College.

In the closing page of his Belief: A Memoir (Savannah, GA, 2007), N. John (Jack) Hall speaks of his own happiness in the teaching profession by citing and agreeing with an oftuttered sentence of mine, "In my next life, I want to be an English professor."

But, for me, where? In a selective. top-rank private university or liberal arts college—say, Harvard or Swarthmore—or in the sort of place where I've spent most of my time here— Lehman College, CUNY in the Bronx? Well, given the fact that my own education was exclusively in public universities, that I'm a refugee from Nazi Germany and thus feel 1 owe this country something, and that many of the students I've taught are themselves immigrants, either documented or undocumented (and who knows or cares), it's an easy choice: I'd opt for an urban university like CUNY.



Of course, it is a hypothetical—and if I come back at all, it'll probably be as a snail or a sloth. --**Gerhard Joseph**, **June 2015** 


[Update: Joseph retired in August and is returning to Lehman to teach a course in the English Department]
